#### **COVID AND OTTAWA PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATES**

#### Vaccination of children aged 5-11

Ottawa residents can now book COVID-19 vaccine appointments for five to 11-year-olds (born 2016 or earlier) through the provincial booking system. OPH urges everyone who is eligible for their COVID-19 vaccine to get fully vaccinated. The higher the vaccination rates are in our community, the better chance we have of protecting those around us and keeping COVID-19 levels in the community and schools low.

Ottawa Public Health is aiming to make vaccination for these young residents and their families as easy and comfortable as possible, with new child-friendly signage and fun stickers to take home. Check the website for tips on how to prepare for your child's appointment, such as giving children a snack beforehand and bringing a comforting toy or music to listen to.

#### Third dose Update

Following the <u>Provincial announcement</u> on eligibility for third doses (booster doses) of the COVID-19 vaccines, Ottawa Public Health is expanding capacity at its four <u>community clinics</u> to operate seven days per week. This applies to the following clinic locations:

All Ottawa residents who meet these criteria will be able to book an appointment for their third dose through the provincial COVID-19 vaccination portal or by calling the Provincial Vaccine Contact Centre at 1-833-943-3900, starting Saturday November 6 at 8 am. Appointments are encouraged, as drop-in availability is limited.

Eligible residents can also reach out to select local pharmacies for their third dose, using the provincial pharmacy locator to find those that provide the booster dose. Many healthcare workers and first responders will have the opportunity to receive their third dose through their employer.

A third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine will be given at least twenty-four weeks (six months) after the second dose. All booster doses will be mRNA vaccines. Mixing COVID-19 vaccines is safe, effective, and enables Ontarians to benefit from the protection of a booster dose. We encourage all those eligible to book an appointment and get their third COVID-19 vaccine at their local pharmacy or a community clinic.

Getting your third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine does not impact your flu vaccine — COVID-19 vaccines may be given at the same time as, or before/after other vaccines. Individuals two years of age and older can visit participating pharmacies to receive their flu vaccine. Individuals aged six months and older may also receive their flu vaccine from their family doctor or nurse practitioner. Anyone aged six months and older who lives, works or attends school in Ontario is eligible to receive the publicly funded flu vaccine at no cost.

#### TRANSIT UPDATES – OC TRANSPO

#### Free Transit in December

OC Transpo will be offering unlimited free service on all forms of transit (buses, O-Train and Para Transpo) to customers in December, in recognition of the considerable disruption faced by transit users following the suspension of O-Train Line 1 service.

OC Transpo is making unlimited free transit in December as easy as possible for customers:

- From December 1 to 31, fare gates at all O-Train stations will be opened and fare boxes and smartcard readers on all OC Transpo buses will be covered.
- Monthly December passes will not be sold.
- Presto customers with auto-renew subscriptions will see a one-cent charge which will be credited back to their account.
- U-Pass customers or customers with a school board issued pass do not need to tap their card at O-Train stations or on OC Transpo buses.
- All Para Transpo trips during December will be at no charge.

Regular fares continue to apply to transit customers travelling on the <u>Société de transport de l'Outaouais</u> (STO) system. Customers who had a monthly pass on their Presto card in November and U-Pass customers should tap their card as they board but no charges will be applied. Other customers will need to pay the applicable STO fare.

#### OC Transpo unveils Ottawa's first battery-electric buses

The four new 40-foot battery-electric buses will be ready to enter service in early 2022 and will be housed at OC Transpo's St-Laurent Garage. The garage has undergone significant retrofits to welcome the new electric buses, with four plug-in style charging stations installed by Envari Energy Solutions, a subsidiary of Hydro Ottawa.

OC Transpo is in the early stages of a fleet conversion plan that will seek to add an additional 74 battery-electric buses to its fleet in 2023, with 450 zero-emission buses phased into operation by 2027. With the gradual phase-out of diesel buses as they reach their end of life, OC Transpo could achieve a fully zero-emission bus fleet by 2036. OC Transpo will seek to leverage

government loans, funding and grants, so that no additional municipal tax funding will be required to convert OC Transpo's transit fleet to zero-emission buses.

In addition to offering a quieter ride, battery-electric buses are expected to offer savings through reduced operating costs. Converting from diesel-powered vehicles to electric is also a key component of the Climate Change Master Plan, the City's overarching framework to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and respond to the current and future effects of climate change.

#### **Quick Facts**

- Chargers installed at the St-Laurent Garage can charge a bus from empty to full in five hours.
- The City's battery-electric buses will be of similar capacity and design as OC Transpo's
  existing 40-foot diesel buses to provide a standardized customer experience, with route
  planning based on a range of 250 kilometres in typical urban operation without
  recharging.
- Battery-electric buses are currently the most widely used zero-emission technology in the transit industry and are on the roads of several Canadian municipalities, including Montréal, Toronto, Edmonton, and Winnipeg.
- A diesel-powered bus consumes on average 35,000 litres of fuel per year.
- The Climate Change Master Plan includes the goal of reducing emissions from City operations by 100 per cent by 2040.

#### LOCAL DEVELOPMENT


#### St Pat's Home Development - Phase 2

The Zoning By-law amendment was passed at the City Council meeting on November 10 to permit the construction of a 7 story apartment building and rezone the site to Residential Fifth Density, Subzone A with exceptions and a height limit of 24 metres, to reduce the ratio of required vehicular parking for tenants from 1.2 spaces/dwelling unit to 0.9 spaces/dwelling unit, and to regularize and bring forward the zoning for the existing St. Patrick's Home. The proposed apartment building is to be located on the north side of the site between the existing parking lot and the trees. The trees are not proposed to be removed or negatively impacted.

#### **Confederation Heights Master Plan**

Canada Lands Company held Public Engagement Sessions on November 23 and November 25 to inform the public of the Master Plan for Confederation Heights. Occupying 465 acres, Confederation Heights is ideally situated to become a sustainable, transit oriented, urban mixed-use community that will serve as a federal employment hub over the next 25 years. The master plan will guide a wide range of stakeholders to outline future land uses, built forms, heritage commemoration elements, servicing infrastructure, as well as establish framework for additional affordable housing, sustainable urban and architectural principles, public realm, and amenities for the broader community. With the extension of the LRT south, an exciting opportunity exists to develop our community into the future.

#### **INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS**


#### **Riverside Drive Repaving**

Approximately 20 arterial roads that were slated for repaving this calendar year are significantly delayed and are now pushed to Spring 2022, including Riverside Drive between Walkley Road and the St Pat's Home.

Labour shortages, utility locate work and concrete work in advance of repaving are all major issues contributing to delays on road construction projects.

#### LRT Phase 2 – Hunt Club Closures

Daytime peak and off-peak lane closures started on November 23, 2021 and was required to advance the bridge deck and approach work, which span the full width across Hunt Club road. To safely allow this work to proceed, crews continue to conduct this work within a lane closure, resulting in the temporary closure of lanes on Hunt Club road and the Airport Parkway on and off ramps.



The city anticipates the following impacts:

- Closure of the Southbound Airport Parkway ramp to Eastbound Hunt Club road from November 23<sup>rd</sup> to February 11<sup>th</sup>
- Closure of Northbound Airport Parkway on ramp from Eastbound Hunt Club road from November 23<sup>rd</sup> to February 11<sup>th</sup>
- Closure of Southbound Airport Parkway on ramp from Westbound Hunt Club road from November 23<sup>rd</sup> to February 11<sup>th</sup>
- Closure of Northbound Airport Parkway off ramp to Westbound Hunt Club road from November 23<sup>rd</sup> to February 11<sup>th</sup>
- Single lane closures on Eastbound Hunt club road between the Airport Parkway and Daze street 24 hours a day / 7 days a week

 Single lane closures on Westbound Hunt Club road between the Airport Parkway and Daze street from 7pm to 3pm

#### **Walkley Road Bridge**

Stage 2 work of the Walkley Road bridge replacement is still underway. They are currently replacing sidewalls, railings, sidewalks and paving new drive lanes. They anticipate that stage two work will extend until December 17, 2021. They will then switch the traffic to the north side lanes and extend the bridge by 1.4 meters on the south side to abut the Walkley road station, connecting our communities. The end of the project is expected in the first two weeks of February 2022.

### **Hydro One Infrastructure Upgrade**

Hydro One plans to reconductor approximately 11.9km of a high-transmission line which includes the corridor that runs east to west across River Ward just north of McCarthy Woods and south of Southmore-Dickinson.

Hydro One has advised that the work is to replace the conductors on existing circuits (M30A/M31A) with a two-conductor bundle. The voltage of the line will not change and will remain 230kV. The only change is the current carrying ampacity of the line will increase from 648MW to 1080MW. Hydro One has already started preparing the hydro corridor for line replacement (East of Albion Rd and Hawthorne). They started by installing gravel roads and pads and removing minor vegetation. Most of these are taking place outside River ward, however there are some minor activities specific to River Ward are that are taking place close to the river in order to provide just enough access for the road to the towers. Hydro one expects that the bulk of the electrical work will be completed in the Spring and Fall of 2022 and 2023 with a bypass around Albion Road Transmission Station for this period. This means that the good news is, there will be no effects to distribution clients, meaning no power outages.

During the construction period access to the corridor will restricted to residents for safety reasons but gained through existing road crossings for Hydro employees at McCarthy Rd (East and West) and on Riverside Dr where existing access gates are in place. Hydro One has begun to reinforce the gated areas with gravel to ensure that vehicles stay to one path and protect the surrounding vegetation.

During the construction period, residents in the area can expect minor noise coming from the equipment in the corridor, however Hydro One's equipment is equipped with Noise

Suppressors, which attenuate the sound to ensure that the noise does not exceed the permitted levels in the Highway Traffic Act. They have assured us that the work will be performed during daylight hours.

Temporary by-pass poles will be installed at two electricity junctions just outside the ward. Once the project is completed there will be little noticeable difference in this transmission line.

#### Is it safe to live near transmission stations and lines?

Electric and magnetic fields (EMFs) are invisible forces that surround all electrical appliances and equipment, power cords and wiring, and outdoor power lines and equipment operated by utility companies. These fields are at extremely low frequencies. The field strength is strongest close to its source and fades rapidly as you move away from the source.

Health Canada does not consider that any precautionary measures are needed regarding daily exposures to EMFs at extremely low frequencies. There is no conclusive evidence of any harm caused by exposures at levels found in Canadian homes and schools, including those located just outside the boundaries of power line corridors.

## How are electric and magnetic fields along the transmission corridor expected to change?

The modifications will be done according to the Canadian Electrical Code that meets the Canadian Standards Association requirements accounting for public safety. The second circuit will be installed on the existing transmission structures and based on Hydro One's calculations, they project that the electric and magnetic fields (EMFs) along the transmission corridor would not substantially change.

At a meeting with Hydro One earlier this year, I was reassured there will only be a slight increase of EMFs as a result of this project. Currently the line emits a reading of 16 milligauss(mG) and the reconductoring could see the reading increase to 18mG. Internationally, voluntary exposure guidelines recommend a residential magnetic field exposure limit of 2,000mG and an occupational exposure limit of 10,000mG. The World Health Organization endorses these guidelines set out by the International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection, and both organizations regularly review them.

#### **Hydro Ottawa Pole Replacement**

Hydro Ottawa is currently undergoing Pole Replacement and tree trimming on Riverside Dr and Walkley RD. This could result in minor power disruptions to residents in our community. This work is slated to take place from November 15 – December 17, 2021.

#### **Hunt Club Riverside Park Community Centre**

With capacity limits now lifted for community centres, more events may now be held indoors. The Centre is open and offering reduced programming at this time. In January 2022, a full slate of programming will be offered. ## Mooney's Bay Toboggan Hill

Following the abrupt closure of the Mooney's Bay Toboggan Hill in the winter of 2021, City Council approved my motion, unanimously, directing the Parks and Recreation General Manager to address safety issues he has with the Hill, in order that it re-open for this winter. The Hill is open to the public! The City will be installing signage in various locations warning users of the risks involved with tobogganing.

#### **Skiing – Terry Fox Athletic Centre**

The Terry Fox Athletic Facility features an extensive outdoor track and field complex featuring an international standard lighted 400-metre polyurethane-surfaced eight-lane running track with multiple throwing and jumping event facilities. The facility also has 3 lit premium classed sports fields. During the winter, the facility turns into a cross-country ski centre (Mooney's Bay Ski Centre) featuring five-kilometre of track set lit trails for classic and skate-skiing and includes a ski school for all ages and abilities.
